Bonus points will be awarded for finishing the **EXTRA CREDIT** activity for the appropriate grade level. We will also be learning a **MEMORY VERSE** for camp, as well as some **SONGS**. Weather permitting, there may be huge snow piles that allow for some degree of sledding and digging...We will have to see.





Things to Know Before You Come

INTRODUCTION

Israel's leader was dead. Joshua had been faithful to the end, bringing the children of Israel into the Promised Land. He led their armies as they began to conquer the inheritance just as God had commanded them to do:

¹⁶ "But of the cities of these peoples which the LORD your God gives you *as* an inheritance, you shall let nothing that breathes remain alive, ¹⁷ but you shall utterly destroy them: the Hittite and the Amorite and the Canaanite and the Perizzite and the Hivite and the Jebusite, just as the LORD your God has commanded you, ¹⁸ lest they teach you to do according to all their abominations which they have done for their gods, and you sin against the LORD your God. – Deuteronomy 20:16-18

- 1. When the children of Israel entered the Promised Land what was allowed to remain alive?
- 2. Why did God command them to utterly [completely!] destroy these people?

Under Joshua, the children of Israel had begun this enormous task of completely destroying the Canaanites out of the land. They watched God crumble the walls of Jericho! They saw the sun stand still so that they could defeat a huge army! Although their parents in the wilderness had died because they were afraid of the giants in the land, the children of Israel under Joshua saw that they could conquer ANY GIANT – ANY ARMY with God on their side!

But now Joshua was gone. There was still land to take, and enemies to drive out. God was still on their side, if they obeyed Him. But they did not.





And I have also said, 'I will not drive them out before you; they will become traps for you, and their gods will become snares to you.'"


SIN

God knew that if the children of Israel did not <u>completely</u> destroy the inhabitants of the land, they would learn the wicked ways of the inhabitants and worship their idols. And that was exactly what happened.

Baal and Ashtaroth were the idols of the Canaanites. <u>**Read Judges 2:11-13**</u> and notice what happened because the Israelites did not drive the Canaanites out of the land. Notice the contrast between the way the Israelites behaved towards God and the way they acted towards the idols!

sight of the LORD. ² So the LORD sold them into the hand of Jabin king of Canaan, who reigned in Hazor. The

commander of his army *was* Sisera, who dwelt in Harosheth Hagoyim. ³ And the children of Israel cried out to the LORD; for Jabin had nine hundred chariots of iron, and for twenty years he had harshly oppressed the children of Israel.

⁴ Now Deborah, a prophetess, the wife of Lapidoth, was judging Israel at that time. ⁵ And she would sit under the palm tree of Deborah between Ramah and Bethel in the mountains of Ephraim. And the children of Israel came up to her for judgment.

⁶ Then she sent and called for Barak the son of Abinoam from

Kedesh in Naphtali, and said to him, "Has not the LORD God of Israel commanded, 'Go and deploy *troops* at Mount Tabor; take with you ten thousand men of the sons of Naphtali and of the sons of Zebulun; ⁷ and against you I will deploy Sisera, the commander of Jabin's army, with his chariots and his multitude at the River Kishon; and I will deliver him into your hand'?" ⁸ And Barak said to her, "If you will go with me, then I will go; but if you will not go with me, I will not go!" ⁹ So she said, "I will surely go with you; nevertheless there will be no glory for you in the journey you are taking, for the LORD will sell Sisera into the hand of a woman." Then Deborah arose and went with Barak to Kedesh.

¹⁰ And Barak called Zebulun and Naphtali to Kedesh; he went

up with ten thousand men under his command, and Deborah went up with him. ¹¹ Now Heber the Kenite, of the children of Hobab the father-in-law of Moses, had separated himself from the Kenites and pitched his tent near the terebinth tree at Zaanaim, which *is* beside Kedesh. ¹² And they reported to Sisera that Barak the son of Abinoam had gone up to Mount Tabor. ¹³ So Sisera gathered together all his chariots, nine hundred chariots of iron, and all the people who *were* with him, fromHarosheth Hagoyim to the River Kishon. ¹⁴ Then Deborah said to Barak, "Up! For this *is* the day in which the LORD has delivered Sisera into your hand. Has not the LORD gone out before you?" So Barak went down from Mount Tabor with ten thousand men following him. ¹⁵ And the LORD routed Sisera and all *his* chariots and all *his* army with the edge of the sword before Barak; and Sisera alighted from *his* chariot and fled away on foot. ¹⁶ But Barak pursued the chariots and the army as far as Harosheth Hagoyim, and all the army of Sisera fell by the edge of the sword; not a man was left.

¹⁷ However, Sisera had fled away on foot to the tent of Jael, the

wife of Heber the Kenite; for *there was* peace between Jabin king of Hazor and the house of Heber the Kenite. ¹⁸ And Jael went out to meet Sisera, and said to him, "Turn aside, my lord, turn aside to me; do not fear." And when he had turned aside with her into the tent, she covered him with a blanket. ¹⁹ Then he said to her, "Please give me a little water to drink, for I am thirsty." So she opened a jug of milk, gave him a drink, and covered him. ²⁰ And he said to her, "Stand at the door of the tent, and if any man comes and inquires of you, and says, 'Is there any man here?' you shall say, 'No.' " ²¹ Then Jael, Heber's wife, took a tent peg and took a hammer in her hand, and went softly to him and drove the peg into his temple, and it went down into the ground; for he was fast asleep and weary. So he died. ²² And then, as Barak pursued Sisera, Jael came out to meet him, and said to him, "Come, I will show you the man whom you seek." And when he went into her *tent*, there lay Sisera, dead with the peg in his temple.









(Additional details for bonus points are in Judges 5:8).



¹ Then the children of Israel did evil in the sight of the LORD. So the

LORD delivered them into the hand of Midian for seven years, ² and the hand of Midian prevailed against Israel. Because of the Midianites, the children of Israel made for themselves the dens, the caves, and the strongholds which *are* in the mountains. ³ So it was, whenever Israel had sown, Midianites would come up; also Amalekites and the people of the East would come up against them. ⁴ Then they would encamp against them and destroy the produce of the earth as far as Gaza, and leave no sustenance for Israel, neither sheep nor ox nor donkey. ⁵ For they would come up with their livestock and their tents, coming in as numerous as locusts; both they and their camels were without number; and they would enter the land to destroy it. ⁶ So Israel was greatly impoverished because of the Midianites, and the children of Israel cried out to the LORD.

⁷ And it came to pass, when the children of

Israel cried out to the LORD because of the Midianites, ⁸ that the LORD sent a prophet to the children of Israel, who said to them, "Thus says the LORD God of Israel: 'I brought you up from Egypt and brought you out of the house of bondage; ⁹ and I

delivered you out of the hand of the Egyptians and out of the hand of all who oppressed you, and drove them out before you and gave you their land. ¹⁰ Also I said to you, "I *am* the LORD your God; do not fear the gods of the Amorites, in whose land you dwell." But you have not obeyed My voice.'"

¹¹ Now the Angel of the LORD came and sat

under the terebinth tree which *was* in Ophrah, which *belonged* to Joash the Abiezrite, while his son Gideon threshed wheat in the winepress, in order to hide *it* from the Midianites. ¹² And the Angel of the LORD appeared to him, and said to him, "The LORD *is* with you, you mighty man of valor!" ¹³ Gideon said to Him, "O my lord, if the LORD is with us, why then has all this happened to us? And where *are* all His miracles which our fathers told us about, saying, 'Did not the LORD

bring us up from Egypt?' But now the LORD has forsaken us and delivered us into the hands of the Midianites." ¹⁴ Then the LORD turned to him and said, "Go in this might of yours, and you shall save Israel from the hand of the Midianites. Have I not sent you?" ¹⁵ So he said to Him, "O my Lord, how can I save Israel? Indeed my clan *is* the weakest in Manasseh, and I *am* the least in my father's house." ¹⁶ And the LORD said to him, "Surely I will be with you, and you shall defeat the Midianites as one man."

¹⁷ Then he said to Him, "If now I have found favor in Your

sight, then show me a sign that it is You who talk with me. ¹⁸ Do not depart from here, I pray, until I come to You and bring out my offering and set *it* before You." And He said, "I will wait until you come back." ¹⁹ So Gideon went in and prepared a young goat, and unleavened bread from an ephah of flour. The meat he put in a basket, and he put the broth in Ancaster Gathering ~ Grade 4-7 Page 26 a pot; and he brought *them* out to Him under the terebinth tree and presented *them*. ²⁰ The Angel of God said to him, "Take the meat and the unleavened bread and lay *them* on this rock, and pour out the broth." And he did so. ²¹ Then the Angel of the LORD put out the end of the staff that *was* in His hand, and touched the meat and the unleavened bread; and fire rose out of the rock and consumed the meat and the unleavened bread. And the Angel of the LORD departed out of his sight.

²² Now Gideon perceived that He *was* the Angel of the

LORD. So Gideon said, "Alas, O Lord GOD! For I have seen the Angel of the LORD face to face." ²³ Then the LORD said to him, "Peace *be* with you; do not fear, you shall not die." ²⁴ So Gideon built an altar there to the LORD, and called it The-LORD-*Is*-Peace. To this day it *is* still in Ophrah of the Abiezrites.

²⁵ Now it came to pass the same night

that the LORD said to him, "Take your father's young bull, the second bull of seven years old, and tear down the altar of Baal that your father has, and cut down the wooden image that *is* beside it; ²⁶ and build an altar to the LORD your God on top of this rock in the proper arrangement, and take the second bull and offer a burnt sacrifice with the wood of the image which you shall cut down." ²⁷ So Gideon took ten men from among his servants and did as the LORD had said to him. But because he feared his father's household and the men of the city too much to do *it* by day, he did *it* by night. ²⁸ And when the men of the city arose early in the morning, there was the altar of Baal, torn down; and the wooden image that *was* beside it was cut down, and the second bull was being offered on the altar *which had been* built.

1 Then Jerubbaal (that is, Gideon) and all the

people who were with him rose early and encamped beside the well of Harod, so that the camp of the Midianites was on the north side of them by the hill of Moreh in the valley. 2 And the Lord said to Gideon, "The people who are with you are too many for Me to give the Midianites into their hands, lest Israel claim glory for itself against Me, saying, 'My own hand has saved me.' 3 Now therefore, proclaim in the hearing of the people, saying, 'Whoever is fearful and afraid, let him turn and depart at once from Mount Gilead.'" And twenty-two thousand of the people returned, and ten thousand remained.

⁴ But the LORD said to Gideon, "The people *are* still *too* many; bring them down to the

water, and I will test them for you there. Then it will be, *that* of whom I say to you, 'This one shall go with you,' the same shall go with you; and of whomever I say to you, 'This one shall not go with you,' the same shall not go." ⁵ So he brought the people down to the water. And the LORD said to Gideon, "Everyone who laps from the water with his tongue, as a dog laps, you shall set apart by himself; likewise everyone who gets down on his knees to drink." ⁶ And the number of those who lapped, *putting* their hand to their mouth, was three hundred men; but all the rest of the people got down on their knees to drink water. ⁷ Then the LORD said to Gideon, "By the three hundred men who lapped I will save you, and deliver the Midianites into your hand. 









What do you know about the instructions from the angel to Manoah's wife (Judges 13)?



The angel told Manoah's wife that her son was to be a Nazarite. What is a "Nazarite"? Under the law of Moses, a Nazarite was a man or a woman who took a special vow to set themselves apart to be devoted and holy to God in ways that were similar to the High Priest. In this chart, let's compare what a Nazarite was to do with what a High Priest was to do! Fill in the left hand column with the similarities between what the Nazarite and the High Priest was to do.

1. The Nazarite was supposed to be someone special to God like the High Priest. Who is our High Priest (Hebrews 4:14)?

2. Who should we try to follow or imitate (1 Peter 2:21-22)?

The first instruction for the Nazarite and the High Priest was to be holy or "set apart" for God. Let's think about what being "set apart" means!

Can you think of and draw something in the box that you have "set apart" from the others (maybe a favorite toy, or particular outfit or nice dishes that you only use on a special occasion)?

Just like that toy, or outfit or dish that is different from the rest and particularly special to you, God wanted the Nazarite - and wants all His people - to be different from the rest and particularly special to Him. Let's look at HOW God's people (both the Nazarite and us!) are supposed to be different and special!

But as he which hath called you is holy, so be ye holy in all manner of conversation [conduct]; Because it is written, Be ye holy; for I am holy. *1 Peter 1: 15-16*

How the Nazarite was different:

The Nazarite was to separate himself from wine or alcohol. Proverbs 31:4 tells us that getting drunk on wine causes one to forget God's law, but God wants His special people to have His Word in their minds day and night! God wants His holy people to get rid of anything that will keep them from remembering His Word.

1. Can you think of anything that might keep you from thinking about God's Word that you can try to get rid of?


The Nazarite was not to shave his head. Just like the High Priest wore the words "Holiness to the LORD" on his forehead as a reminder that his mind was to be "set apart" for God (Exodus 28:36). The Nazarite's hair was a reminder of the same thing. We should also keep our minds holy for God, by filling them with God's Word.



2. Read Joshua 1:8, and write down two or three things you can do to help you think about God's Word more.

The Nazarite (and the High Priest) was not to go near any dead thing. Death is the sad result of sin, and God wants us to know that we must stay as far away from sin as possible.

Try this experiment so you can see how God wants you to stay far away from sin. Ask your mom or dad for two magnets. Write "me" on one, and "sin" on the other one. Put the magnets together, and feel how easily they are "attracted" to each other! Now turn one of the magnets over, and feel the two magnets "repelling" each other. THAT'S exactly what God wanted the Nazarite to learn by not going near anything connected with sin – push it as far away as possible! The children of Israel mingled with the nations around them. God wanted Samson to be different - a Nazarite to remind the Israelites that they were supposed to be separate from the sin of those nations.



We will see that although Samson was supposed to be a Nazarite, he did not follow the LESSONS of the Nazarite very well at all!

⁴ Afterward it happened that he loved a woman in the Valley of Sorek, whose

name was Delilah. ⁵ And the lords of the Philistines came up to her and said to her, "Entice him, and find out where his

great strength *lies,* and by what *means* we may overpower him, that we may bind him to afflict him; and every one of us will give you eleven hundred *pieces* of silver.

⁶ So Delilah said to Samson, "Please tell me where your great strength *lies*, and with what you may be

bound to afflict you." ⁷ And Samson said to her, "If they bind me with seven fresh bowstrings, not yet dried, then I shall become weak, and be like any *other* man." ⁸ So the lords of the Philistines brought up to her seven fresh bowstrings, not yet dried, and she bound him with them. ⁹ Now *men were* lying in wait, staying with her in the room. And she said to him, "The Philistines *are* upon you, Samson!" But he broke the bowstrings as a strand of yarn breaks when it touches fire. So the secret of his strength was not known. ¹⁰ Then Delilah said to Samson, "Look, you have mocked me and told me lies. Now, please tell me what you may be bound with." ¹¹ So he said to her, "If they bind me securely with new ropes that have never been used, then I shall become weak, and be like any *other* man."

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¹² Therefore Delilah took new ropes and bound him with them, and said to him, "The Philistines *are* upon you, Samson!" And *men were* lying in wait, staying in the room. But he broke them off his arms like a thread.

¹³ Delilah said to Samson, "Until now you have mocked me and told me lies. Tell me what you may be bound with." And he said to her, "If you weave the seven locks of my head into the web of the loom"— ¹⁴ So she wove *it* tightly with the batten of the loom, and said to him, "The Philistines *are* upon you, Samson!" But he awoke from his sleep, and pulled out the batten and the web from the loom. ¹⁵ Then she said to him, "How can you say, 'I love you,' when your heart *is* not with me? You have mocked me these three times, and have not told me where your great strength *lies.*"

¹⁶ And it came to pass, when she

pestered him daily with her words and pressed him, so that his soul was vexed to death, ¹⁷ that he told her all his heart, and said to her, "No razor has ever come upon my head, for I *have been* a Nazirite to God from my mother's womb. If I am shaven, then my strength will leave me, and I shall become weak, and be like any *other* man." ¹⁸ When Delilah saw that he had told her all his heart, she sent and called for the lords of the Philistines, saying, "Come up once more, for he has told me all his heart." So the lords of the Philistines came up to her and brought the money in their hand. ¹⁹ Then she lulled him to sleep on her knees, and called for a man and had him shave off the seven locks of his head. Then she began to torment him, and his strength left him. ²⁰ And she said, "The Philistines *are* upon you, Samson!" So he awoke from his sleep, and said, "I will go out as before, at other times, and shake myself free!" But he did not know that the LORD had departed from him. ²¹ Then the Philistines took him and put out his eyes, and brought him down to Gaza. They bound him with bronze fetters, and he became a grinder in the prison.

²² However, the hair of his head began to grow again after it had

been shaven. ²³ Now the lords of the Philistines gathered together to offer a great sacrifice to Dagon their god, and to rejoice. And they said: "Our god has delivered into our hands Samson our enemy!" ²⁴ When the people saw him, they praised their god; for they said: "Our god has delivered into our hands our enemy, The destroyer of our land, And the one who multiplied our dead." ²⁵ So it happened, when their hearts were merry, that they said, "Call for Samson, that he may perform for us." So they called for Samson from the prison, and he performed for them. And they stationed him between the pillars. ²⁶ Then Samson said to the lad who held him by the hand, "Let me feel the pillars which support the temple, so that I can lean on them." ²⁷ Now the temple was full of men and women. All the lords of the Philistines *were* there—about three thousand men and women on the roof watching while Samson

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performed. ²⁸ Then Samson called to the LORD, saying, "O Lord GOD, remember me, I pray! Strengthen me, I pray, just this once, O God, that I may with one *blow* take vengeance on the

Philistines for my two eyes!" ²⁹ And Samson took hold of the two middle pillars which supported the temple, and he braced himself against them, one on his right and the other on his left.

³⁰ Then Samson said, "Let me die with the Philistines!" And he

pushed with *all his* might, and the temple fell on the lords and all the people who *were* in it. So the dead


that he killed at his death were more than he had killed in his life. ³¹ And his brothers and all his father's household came down and took him, and brought *him* up and buried him between Zorah and Eshtaol in the tomb of his father Manoah. He had judged Israel twenty years.











Where did it happen (Judges 16)?



Samson was a Nazarite. He was supposed to be "set apart" for God, and yet first he married a Philistine woman, then loved a Philistine harlot, and in this chapter he loves Delilah from the Valley of Sorek (which means "the choicest wine").

1. Has he been following the lessons of a true Nazarite - keeping "separate" from sin?

James 4:4 says, "Know ye not that the friendship of the world is enmity with God? Whosoever therefore will be a friend of the world is the enemy of God." Samson has mingled with the "world" – the nations around, just like the nation of Israel had done. 
3. Samson loved Delilah, but did Delilah love Samson?



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Think about it...

Samson had an "eye" problem. Over and over again he "saw" the beautiful women of the Philistines and chose them instead of being separate for God. The lust of the eyes has been a problem from the very beginning.

After Samson's hair was cut, he was totally weak. He needed to learn that his strength came from God and not himself!

The Philistines brought Samson out to mock him and treat him cruelly. As Samson leaned on the pillars of the Philistine temple, he prayed to God one last time. "Strengthen me, I pray thee, only this once, O God," he said.

the time of rest and peace and full deliverance from sin.

God raised up judges to deliver Israel from their enemies. The judges were not brave and strong men with huge armies. God wanted the judges and Israel to have f_____in God, who was their true deliverer.

Like G_____, we must remember that everything good we do is for God's glory.
